

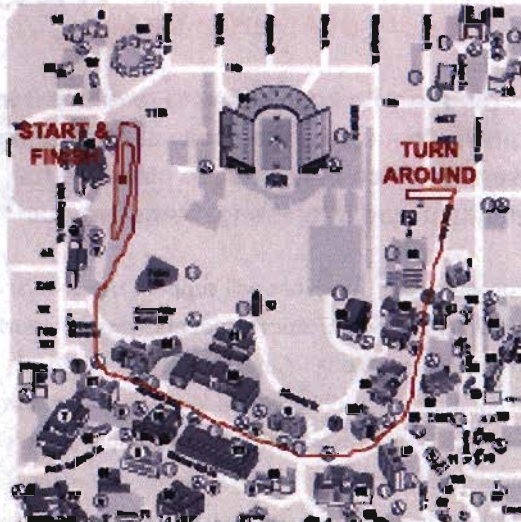

History of America Reads

"Every person who knows how to read has it in their power to magnify themselves, to multiply the ways in which they exist, to make life full, significant, and interesting." -Anonymous

The proceeds from this event will support the scholarship of KU School of Education students who will work with area children through America Reads, a national campaign initiated in 1996 to provide reading tutors in local schools. Studies reveal that many of our nation's children are not proficient readers and do not meet basic reading requirements for their respective age groups. Research shows that children who have underdeveloped reading skills at the end of the third grade will have difficulty elevating these skills to the level of their peers in subsequent years of education. These children are also more likely to drop out of school. Early intervention can significantly improve students' reading abilities. America Reads involves educators, parents, librarians, business people, senior citizens, college students, and community and religious groups to help children learn to read by the end of the third grade.
